



International Online-Conference on

"Digital Fragmentations and Digital Sovereignty"

17 & 18 September 2021

This conference addresses the intricate interplay between digital sovereignty and fragmentations of Cyberspace and Internet governance. Recent developments show a significant increase in national regulations enacted to localize data, protect critical infrastructures, and control or censor online content as many states claim digital sovereignty over cyberspace. Experts warn of "Cyber-Balkanization" as a great challenge not only to institutions of global internet governance but also as threatening future interoperability of digital technologies. However, the meanings and implications of a growing multitude of digital fragmentations goes beyond concerns with the integrity of the global internet and regulatory governance. The growing worldwide prominence of digital sovereignty, which first began in China, indicates that the fundamental question of autonomy of societies, countries and individuals is attached with a new urgency and an unnerving drive for destabilization. Arguably, though, in an extremely interdependent technological civilization that is rendered even more interdependent by layers of digital infrastructures and algorithmic systems, not all implications of fragmentations are negative or destructive. Some forms of digital fragmentation maybe seen as a healthy correction, or at least in a neutral light with both negative and positive interpretations possible.

Raising topics such as Digital Connectivity, Internet Regulation, Data Infrastructure, Data Localization, Cyber Security, Polarization, Surveillance Capitalism, among other issues, the contributors to this volume explore a broader diversity of perspectives and contexts than usually discussed within popular and academic discourses on digital sovereignty and tech autonomy. Contributors offer fresh interpretations, theorizations and a set of practical examples of internet fragmentation trends – their political manifestations apparent in various policy fields such as technopolitics, international trade, European Law, data protection and bilateral relations.
